3. Why is David anointed a second time in 2 Sam. 2:4 when he had already been anointed 1 Sam. 16:13?

4. What can we learn about God's holiness, righteousness, and justice from Uzzah (6)?
5. Why did David desire to build a permanent house for the LORD God (7)?
6. Why did God not let David build the temple (2 Sam. 7:5-7; 1 Chron. 22:8)?

The Challenges of David (11-24)

1. What can we learn about sin and the immediate consequences of sin (discipline) from David's adultery, deceit, and murder (11-12)?
2. What can we learn about demonstrating mercy and justice in the process of reconciling with those who have offended (hurt) us (14)?
